### **DEDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL**

Windmill Community Centre, 18 October

*Present:* Oldfield (chair), Higham, O'Neill, Robinson, Snashall, Swadling, Swan, Watts, parish clerk, one member of the public and *DN* representative.

#### 10 Minute Forum

A resident on the south end of New Street expressed the concern of herself and her neighbours that the 20mph limit was not being observed, having measured speeds of 46–48mph, and also that vibration from the increasing volume of heavy vehicles was causing damage to the foundations of the buildings on that part of the road. She requested enforcement of the speed limit as happens in Adderbury and was told that the PC has already made such a request.

### **Finance & General Purposes**

Cllr Oldfield was thanked for her work on acquiring funds to repair the Windmill roof. Work is currently scheduled to begin in February 2024.

The quote of £14,325 for refurbished cricket nets to be paid from S106 monies was accepted.

### **Highways and Transport**

The PC is continuing its request for CDC to install an air diffusion tube to monitor air quality in the vicinity of the traffic lights.

Cllr Swan was thanked for speaking to RS Transport about the high volume of HGV traffic through Hempton which has subsequently reduced.

Cllr Timms was thanked for making replacement posts for those damaged round the Market Place greens.

#### **Environment & Recreation**

No Mow May: Mary Robinson was congratulated on her comprehensive draft report on 2023's project and analysis of the parish's response. There was agreement that any future efforts should focus on doing less but better; for instance, cutting everything except for specific areas designated to encourage wildflower growth and adding signage there, indicating the reason for the lack of mowing.

Welford's Piece: A design for the extended play area to be funded with S106 monies is underway.

#### **Planning**

No objection

The Paddocks, Deddington: single storey rear extension. Neighbour comment in support of application. Fairacre, 17 St Johns Way, Hempton: remove existing conservatory and enlarge existing rear extension. Land Adjoining and West of Stonecroft House, Clifton Road, Deddington: erect 5 single storey dwellings for people 60 years or older with access, landscaping, and associated infrastructure.

Re-consultation of existing application previously commented on in March 2023, following several minor amendments including materials, design, layout. PC strongly supports proposal made in this application to convert current Y junction at Earls Lane with a T junction.

The Threshing Barn, Pound Court, Deddington: topping of pear tree along the west boundary of the rear garden.

Deddington Manor, New Street: Fell holly. The applicant has planted 50 indigenous trees in the last year and is planning to plant a further 50 this winter to ensure the biodiversity gain is clear.

### The Complete Works of Shakespeare at the Windmill

Friday the thirteenth might be an inauspicious night to put on such a mighty production, particularly one which included 'the Scottish play'. Yet, in spite of the date, much fun was had by all and nobody died – oh, correct that – many people died but that's Shakespeare.

The BALA Theatre Troupe (aka Ben, Ali, Lee and Adrian) literally threw themselves into an energetic and hilarious performance of *The Complete Works of Shakespeare*, adapted from the script of The Reduced Shakespeare Company. Under Ben's direction, Ali, Lee and Adrian rattled through thirty-seven plays and one hundred and fifty-four sonnets in ninety-seven minutes. At breakneck speed these talented actors changed character and costume to transport the audience from Verona, to Scotland (complete with Scottish accents) and finally, with many stops between, to Denmark, to the misfortunes of Hamlet. In authentic fashion, the men played the women and the women played the men.

There was music, dancing, ghosts, sword-fighting and audience participation. We should have been fore-

warned when the show started with a hapless youth on the front row being mocked by the actors. Turned out that was staged and he was one of the cast, but the same cannot be said for the young lady who was co-opted to play Ophelia. She rose magnificently to the occasion and produced a blood-curdling scream on cue, then again and again. In pantomime fashion, the audience joined in with shouting and swaying on command and produced a respectably loud noise and convincing performance.

And nobody could argue that they didn't get value for money. When the script actually finished at nine-ty-three minutes, they ran the whole of Hamlet again, but faster. When they still had a minute to spare, they ran it faster and backwards!

The energy, cleverness, madness and mayhem of BALA made for a thoroughly enjoyable evening. And all within walking distance of the centre of Deddington. I shall certainly be looking out for more productions by BALA and more live events on my doorstep at the Windmill.



### A TESTING TIME FOR THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

eddington's Neighbourhood Plan (NP) is still with the examiner appointed to test its viability. He asked us a few questions for clarity and we proposed an amendment to one of our policies – that the number of four- and five-bedroomed houses on a new development be limited to 20%, since we know the chief need in Deddington parish is for smaller homes for families starting out and older downsizers.

As you know, the NP steering group and the parish council spent a year mulling over your votes in the public consultation last summer, as well as the pros and cons of the various sites on offer. To recap, in the end we allocated one site – north of Earls Lane and east of the Banbury Road.

We favoured the site partly because of the public vote and also because of its location closer to the centre of Deddington village than any of the other options, but also its being reasonably unobtrusive. The community benefits offered with the site include a nursery building in close proximity to the primary school. As parents and others will know, the current nursery building by the entrance to the Windmill Centre is on its last legs.

Another key offering is the car park for 20 cars alongside Earls Lane, which we hope will enable the Health Centre to expand on its current site.

We have stuck by our request that we want the nursery and the overspill car park to be installed at the start of the allocated development rather than halfway through. We await somewhat anxiously any modifications the examiner may require for the Plan.

A planning application for developing this site with 90 homes has already been submitted but CDC will not reach a decision until after the end of January 2024, allowing time for the NP to be 'made'. As well as the nursery and car park, the application provides for a community orchard between the car park and the housing, a biodiversity zone/wildflower meadow at the north end of the site, an extension to the belt of trees at the end of The Beeches and, of course, the required play area on a central green.

Some parishioners may be disappointed at the number of new homes allocated – 85, the figure amended by the parish council. CDC's draft Local Plan, now out for consultation, does not specify a target number for individual villages. Instead it proposes 500 new homes across the 11 larger villages, of which Deddington is one. An eleventh share of this is in the mid-40s, more or less what we were anticipating.

All the same, the steering group is increasingly convinced we were wise to posit a higher figure, endeavouring to future-proof the NP – which lasts until 2040 with a review after five years – the more so since the recent Labour Party conference, where a much more gung-ho approach to planning and housing numbers was promised, should they win the election. In the back of our minds we have our independent Housing Needs Assessment which set a target of 76

homes for the parish until 2040.

In our view, all the alternative sites which proposed fewer houses, had some inherent disadvantage and none of them offered anything like the generous community benefits promised with the site we allocated.

Assuming all goes smoothly with the examiner and Cherwell District Council (CDC) gives its OK, the NP goes on to a referendum. This is organised by CDC, with parishioners invited to cast their vote at a polling station, almost certainly the Windmill. We're hoping for a large turn-out and, a positive vote.

Watch out for an alert when the NP completes its journey through the labyrinth and you can go and cast your vote in the referendum. Fingers crossed.





It is very sad that Debenhams, the main drop-off point for donations for Ukraine, has had to close its doors to the public. However, donations are still being collected from Deddington church and delivered to a depot in Banbury where they are taken by road to the Ukrainian front line. ### **NEWS FROM HEMPTON**

The boundary between the worlds of the living and the dead will have become blurred once again on 31 October, according to pagan belief. The ritual of the Hempton pumpkin trail will be celebrated, together with autumn themed activities, in the Old School Room on Sunday 29 October. Trail maps will be available at £2 each and all proceeds will go to the upkeep of the Old School Room. Scary pumpkins are supposed to keep ghouls and ghosts on their side of the boundary. It seems to work; visitors from the other side have been conspicuous by their absence.

Whilst messing about in the garden I came across a snake. It was basking in the sunshine as cold blooded reptiles are wont to do. It didn't hang around, slithering into the shrubbery. This was my second encounter with snakes since moving to Hempton. Some years ago I disturbed a juvenile grass snake in the garden; it too cleared off sharpish. I would have assumed the recent sighting was a grass snake based on its markings; it was dark grey-green with a bright red and black collar. This threw me a little as I'd only seen photographs or read that a yellow or possibly orange or cream/white collar was its dress code. Fear not, it was not a newly invasive species of venomous viper but a common grass snake with less common sartorial tastes.

They are Britain's longest snake, growing to a metre or more in length. My acquaintance was only an infant some 12 inches from nose to tail. Grass snakes are protected by law in Great Britain (under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981) such that it is illegal to deliberately kill, injure or sell them.

Grass snakes are Britain's only egg-laying snake. The females lay up to around 40 off-white, leathery eggs in June or July, in warm places and preferably rotting vegetation – including garden compost heaps. The eggs hatch into miniature versions of the adults in the late summer months. They like to frequent ponds, particularly during the summer, hunting for fish and amphibians, their favourite food. They will also snack on other endangered freshwater species such as the great crested newt. Dead prey is never taken. Prey is consumed live without using constriction.

There are many subspecies of grass snake. Only one is native to the UK where 'grass snake' refers to

the barred grass snake (Natrix helvetica), a non-venomous member of the Colubridae family. With 249 genera, it is the largest snake family. The earliest species of the family date back to the Oligocene epoch about 34 to 24 million years ago and frequent every continent except Antarctica. The species has predators, including corvids, storks, owls and perhaps other birds of prey, foxes and domestic cats.

In defence they can produce a garlic-smelling fluid from the anal glands and feign death by becoming completely limp when they may also secrete blood from the mouth and nose. They may also perform an aggressive display in defence, hissing and striking. They rarely bite in defence and lack venomous fangs. If caught they often regurgitate the contents of their stomachs.

After breeding in summer, grass snakes tend to hunt often, ranging widely during this time, moving up to several hundred metres in a day. Prey tends to be large compared to the size of the snake, impairing their ability to move. Snakes that have recently eaten rarely move any significant distance and stay in one location, basking to optimise their body temperature until the meal has been digested. Individual snakes may only need two or three significant prey items throughout an entire season.

They shed their skins at least once during the active season. As the outer skin wears and the snake grows, the new skin forms under the old, including the eye scales which may turn a milky blue/white colour, referred to as 'in blue'. The blue-white colour comes from an oily secretion between the old and new skins; the snake will also appear as if covered in dust. This process affects their eyesight and they do not move or hunt during this time; they are also, in common with most other snakes, more aggressive. The outer skin is eventually sloughed in one piece (inside-out) and normal activity is resumed.

Neighbours with garden ponds or compost heaps may be more familiar with these and other reptilian residents. I assume grass snakes are indigenous to the area and gave rise to the obvious connotation with Snake Hill Lane.



### **News from the Health Centre**

Our Health Centre (HC) has a Patient Participation Group (PPG) that works with the practice to represent patients.

The main topic at its last meeting was the new appointment system going online from 6 November. The system will be available via the NHS app or the HC website https://deddingtonhealthcentre.co.uk.

### All non-urgent requests

After entering information about your requirements, keeping it clear, concise and accurate because it forms part of your medical record, a GP will review the request (triage) and signpost you to the most appropriate team member. If you need to be seen face-to-face you will receive a link to make an appointment. You may have a telephone consultation or be signposted to another member of the clinical team. Electronic requests will be the quickest way to get a non-urgent appointment or solution to other queries.

### Urgent medical requests

You can still use the online service and mark it urgent where it will be reviewed by a GP. If it is a medical emergency that does not need 999 but a same day appointment you can call the HC on 01869 338611 where the Patient Services Team will complete the triage form. A GP will decide whether a same day appointment is required. It may be face-to-face or by telephone and will be with the healthcare professional identified by the GP. If the GP does not feel your request needs to be dealt with on the same day, they will review it along with other requests, with the aim of responding within two working days.

If you can't use the online service

You can call the practice and the Patient Services Team will complete the online request form for you. This will be put into the system with all the requests submitted by patients using the online service. If you have someone who can help by going online to use the service on your behalf, this may speed up the request and save a telephone call. However, the team is there to complete the appointment request for you.

GPs will prioritise urgent medical requests first and will then review all other requests in the order they were submitted to the system. Calling the practice will not result in a quicker solution for non-urgent requests.

The aim is to improve access for the centre's 12,500 patients, improve patient care, reduce the 8.00am rush and improve staff wellbeing.

This will be a new system for you and the centre's teams and they ask for your patience whilst we all get used to it. They are grateful for your continued support in what have been the most challenging of times.

The PPG is keen to hear from anyone who feels they have the inclination to apply to become a member of the existing PPG. We hope to be a group that reflects the practice population demographic. To request an application form please email ppg.deddington@nhs.net.





Last month's *DN* carried Mary Robinson's article about the Deddington Museum that never was. It started and ended with talk about an 1896 fire engine. Also, coincidentally last month, Joanna Cox posted on the Facebook group, *Growing Up in Deddington*, a copy of a photograph she had found in a local history book. It pictured Deddington's fire engine and crew in 1923 outside the Unicorn Inn and identified one of the crew as Walter Allen Course of Deddington Mill. Joanna tracked the original photo to her local library in Brackley which also had a note of some of the names.

supply of uniforms, early drills and fighting fires: one of which showed that the first appliance was not at all satisfactory – hence its sale.

Albert Humphries, Don Walker and Walter Gibbs provided me with more recent anecdotal information that has helped identify quite a few of the previously untitled photographs in the DOL Gallery and so I have been able to flesh out the later years. It is also a matter of parish pride that two former Brigade members, Albert Humphries (2001) and Anne Waters (2006), have been awarded MBEs. The resulting extensive and

They were Brackley men except four unnamed ones. It seems that this was a combined Deddington–Brackley crew.

A later 1927 photograph (shown above) in the Fire Station shows a similar combined crew which competed in an annual regional competition.

Inspired by the fact that her grandfather, John Harry Cox (1903–92), was a Deddington firefighter, Joanna delved deeper, leading to a joint effort to create a much needed history of our fire service from its creation in 1883, the 1896 sale Mary referred to and on through to the present day. Joanna's research turned up some early press reports on the formation, fundraising, local

# FROM CHRISTINE GILLESPIE, DEDDINGTON

A hospital stay has vividly brought to my attention how many people and specialties are involved in patients' care. Following an accident, help came from people in the vicinity, ambulance crew and police, who all acted with kindness. On reaching the Coventry A&E reception, triage and the man-

agement of bewildered people were all handled with kindness and patience.

Examinations and referral for further tests were done with tact and lots of positive reassurance.

There was no delay in admission to the ward after observations were passed to specialists for diagnosis. Treatment options were explained calmly and thoroughly and time allowed for decision-making without pressure. As well as the surgeon, registrar, anaesthetist, nursing and other medical staff, there were suppliers of meals and drinks, and cleaners who worked cheerfully, thoroughly and were very tolerant. There are more names of individuals than I can remember, certainly upwards of 20 involved in my care alone. Physiotherapists communicated ways to improve mobility with the least pain and harm. Pharmacists were responsible for the final discharge prescriptions which were detailed and precise and checked again. These observations were of just one ward.

The NHS provided superb care for Sarah during the day with a team of District Nurses but that is not available at night.

The LHNT nurses work closely with GPs and community nurses to help manage symptoms and give each person the appropriate care. By helping people to relax, the nurses make sure patients and their families, get the most from their last moments together. The care is free and given whenever it's needed, whether for a few hours in the day or through the night.

LHNT look after any adult in their last weeks of life. Patients are referred by GPs, community and specialist nurses, hospitals, hospices and sometimes family members.

LHNT receives less than 10% of its income from the government. The rest comes from donations which is why I have become a volunteer and fundraiser. ### **NEWS FROM CLIFTON**

Book Club is at something of a low ebb currently. Having lost Steve, and Chris not quite 'in station' yet, there are some gaps in our line up, so if you want to meet some neighbours, get up to speed with events, drink some fabulous beer (or Merlot with Dave), lend your time to CAST (Clifton Against Speeding Traffic), be part of a vast tool and equipment sharing group, and generally talk so much nonsense so you can't tell your partner what was discussed, then pop along any Thursday at 8.00pm and say hello. You don't have to come back and you can leave any time but 10.00pm is often 'home time'.

CAST will have done more sessions to collect data by the time this is published and results will be passed on for the authorities to take action.

A neighbour writes: 'We all need to do something about the amount of people that block the limited number of footpaths we have in the village. The residents and businesses in the village and their guests are happy to complain about the speed cars travel through the village but some feel it is ok to block a footpath with cars or bins forcing pedestrians, people

with young children in pushchairs or prams and dogs into the road where they aren't safe with oncoming traffic, made worse by the ones speeding. This is especially problematic for those with mobility issues, be they temporary or permanent.'

Will people please ensure they keep paths clear and that cars don't overhang a footpath. If the car is too big for the parking bay then park out on the road safely. Also don't let bushes or other foliage overgrow and close off the pavement.

### From The Fire Station



The Scenario 2 training day at Moreton-in-Marsh proved interesting and worthwhile as the Deddington crew was able to put out fires and search for casualties in controlled situations under the watchful eyes of instructors. Three scenarios were presented during the

course of the day: a domestic dwelling with a ground floor fire, a light industrial unit with a first-floor internal fire and a shopping centre with a fire adjacent to the loading bay. As colleagues from other stations were also attending, two crews with separate appliances were operating. In each case, crews had to locate the trapped casualties and control/extinguish the fire. Each scenario was completed successfully with crews working very well together and tackling the situations correctly.

Each appliance ran an Incident Commander, Pump Operator, two Breathing Apparatus crew and one BA commander and a sixth firefighter. Crews alternated between the domestic and light industrial fires before lunch-time, and joined together to attend the supermarket fire as a two pump incident. After each scenario was completed, an immediate on-site debrief occurred, with a more detailed round up and discussion in the class room at the end of the day.

Well done to Garin Wilby and Corrie King in passing their development and now being fully competent and congratulations to Steve Baker and Cee Jay Harber for passing their BA course.




construction has been de-
