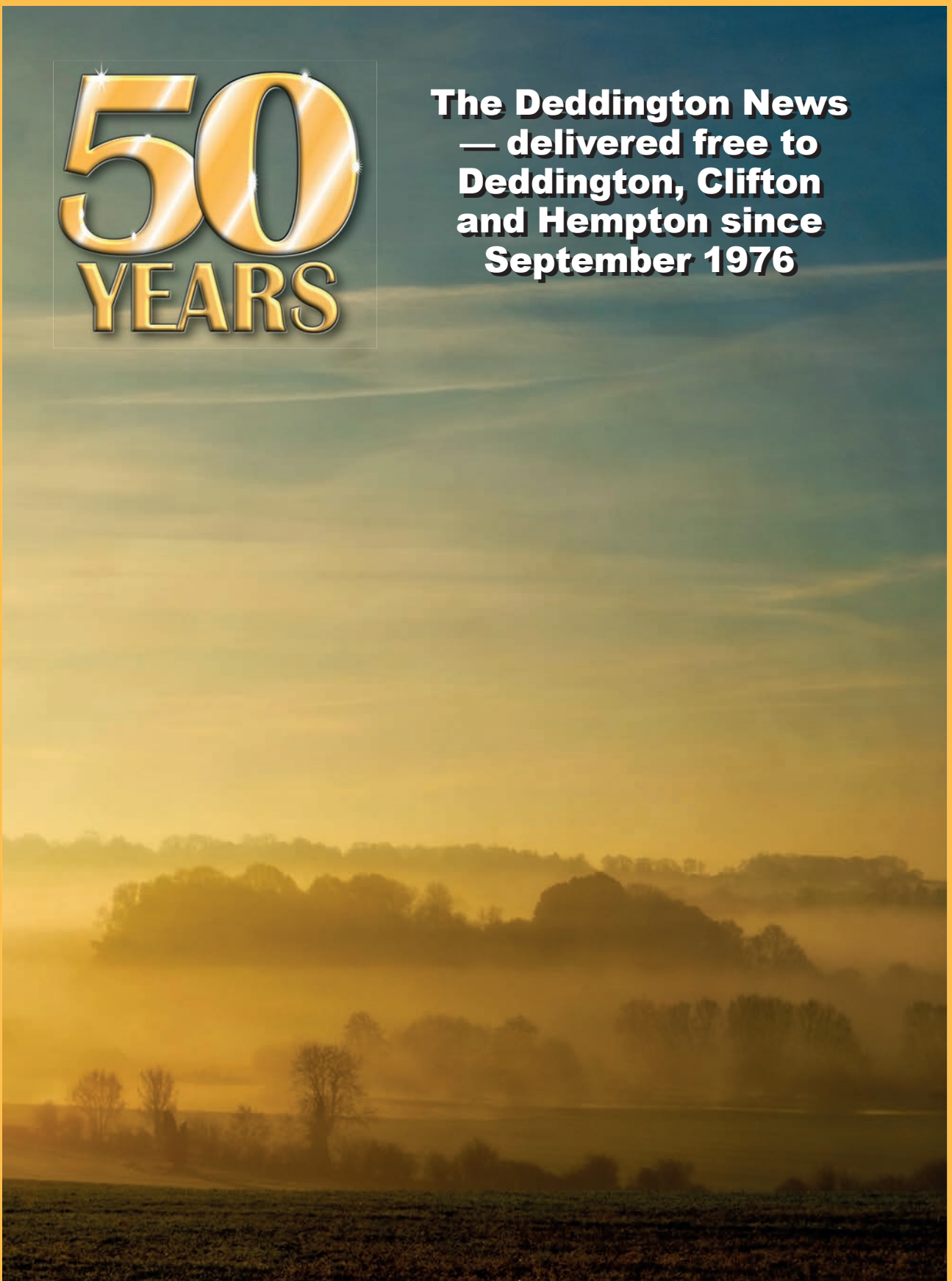

I feel lucky to have been in Deddington in 1975 when Gerard Sullivan, chairman of the Deddington Hall Management Committee (not the current Windmill MC), proposed to Mary Robinson and me that we start a village or parish magazine. Mary had a background in desktop publishing and I was a reasonably competent secretary. We reviewed a few local magazines and decided that A4 was the size to go for. It was a scratchy start with some being highly sceptical about the need for it (including me) and limited income from advertisers who were prepared to give it a go.

Some parish councillors were deeply suspicious, not least following the first issue. However, they supported the *DN* to the tune of £4 per month for the first three months. Our report of the PC meeting following that first issue, records that complaints that it was a waste of ratepayers' money and some businesses hadn't been asked to advertise. There was a demand that *DN* copy should be vetted by the PC before publication. Happily, the PC now positively welcomes me to their meetings.

Fortunately, these initial hurdles were jumped and the *DN* became self-sufficient, with funding from advertisers. There have been hitches along the way when income did not cover our expenditure but, mainly, this has been an occasional blip on the horizon.

Along the way we have had only thirteen other editors: I returned to the hot seat in 2008. Undoubtedly, it's becoming time for someone – or some two – to take over the reins if the parish wants the *News* to continue.

DEDDINGTON PARISH COUNCIL

Meeting held on 15 July at the Windmill

Present: Cox, Gillham, Mobbs, Oldfield, O'Neill, Robinson (chair), Rogers (District), Timms, parish clerk, two members of the public and the DN correspondent.

10 Minute Forum

A resident requested space for a Muslim burial at the Hempton Road cemetery for an immediate relative and non-resident. The cemetery is consecrated land but this does not exclude other faiths. The south-east area the of the cemetery was under discussion by the PC and would need clearing of weeds. There has been a recent precedent of a non-resident having been interred there. It was agreed that future graveyard space should be considered in a new Neighbourhood Plan.

OCC suddenly proposed that six new electric vehicle (EV) charging points be installed in the Bull Ring. the PC was not aware that this proposal was going to be made and a consultation launched, with a closing date of 8 August. Some complaints were received about the loss of regular car parking spaces in the Market Place if the installation goes ahead. The PC was generally in favour but a site meeting will be held with OCC and questions raised.

Planning

No objection

RC Spencer, Hempton Road, Deddington: demolish existing building and erection of new office and storage building with landscaping.

Nellie & Dove, The Tchure, Deddington: installation of replacement non-illuminated signage.

Foxgloves, Hopcraft Lane, Deddington: tree works.

Deddington Parish Church: tree works.

Orchard View, St Thomas Street, Deddington: retrospective for single storey conservatory.

13 Hempton Road, Deddington: two storey rear extension and new porch to the front.

There were no other matters discussed at this abbreviated PC meeting as it fell on the same evening as the doomed FIFA World Cup semi-final, hence several absentee parish councillors. The remainder of the agenda was rolled over to the next meeting to be held on Wednesday 19 August at 7.30pm at the Windmill Centre.

Meeting held on 19 August at the Windmill

Present: Councillors ap Simon, Cox, Mobbs, Oldfield, O'Neill, Robinson (chair), Stapley, Swadling, Timms, Watts, County Councillor Epps, the parish clerk and DN representative.

Finance & General Purposes

Funding is not currently available from OCC for supervision of the Remembrance Day parade. It was agreed to refer to the RBL chairman and that the PC should fund it, not least considering the monies it received from the sale of the old RBL building.

Additional signatories are to be added to the bank accounts for security in the case of absence or illness. Satin Lane allotment rents are to be decided at the September meeting.

Distribution of the PC newsletter was difficult this year. It was agreed the Scouts might be asked to do it or it could be produced on a double sided A4 to be folded and inserted in the DN. A decision will be made at the time of sending another newsletter next year.

Planning permission will be sought to erect a 5G phone mast at the Windmill.

Planning

No objection

Oak Tree House, Fardon Way, Deddington: retrospective, additional windows and raised boundary wall.

Large Scale Development

A meeting was held with the new owners of the Deddington Estate which includes Satin Lane Allotments. They are potentially interested in some development in Deddington but have no plans for the allotment area. The PC noted extreme disappointment at OCC's supportive stance of the application for the large rail freight terminal (OxSRFI) and have written again in objection, particularly considering the cumulative effect of several significant proposed developments in close proximity. The PC's comments are supported by CC Epps.

There have been adjustments to the Puy du Fou application but it remains a huge theme park. The PC agreed to send a further letter of objection.

The PC has been advised that Deddington Neighbourhood Plan is not affected by CDC's current planning status. A meeting will be arranged in September with a view to updating it for the future.

OCC will not adopt the roads on the new development north of the fire station without payment of a significant sum of money. No reply has been received from CDC on adopting the play area.

County Council

Discussions are ongoing regarding work agreed on Fardon Way by the new owners and not yet completed.

Environment & Recreation

The RoSPA inspection was generally good without major issues although some safety concerns have been raised by residents. Advice is to be sought on the continued involvement of Creative Play.

A Muslim burial has now taken place at the Hempton Road cemetery and DPC has been warmly thanked by the family.

Ramps and jumps at the Windmill are being removed. The dangers of these were also pointed by the RoSPA inspector.

Highways

EV charging points in the Bull Ring are to go ahead. There has been recent speeding enforcement carried out on Clifton Road.

Next meeting to be held on 16 September at 7.30pm at the Windmill.

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DH History Corner

As gardeners prepare their produce for the annual Parish Show, it is interesting to reflect on earlier years of the original Horticultural Society (est 1837). David French's research into *Jackson's Oxford Journals* includes a series of annual reports on them between 1850 and 1859. The 1858 show was a highlight as the following extract (newspaper quotes in italics) from David's article tell us:

'The 1858 show was a joint celebration of the 21st anniversary of the Horticultural Society and the first anniversary of the Buccleuch Archery Club, Adderbury (Hon Secretary, Mr CD Faulkner (31)). The Great Western Railway Company *in the most handsome manner*, advertised special return fares to Aynho station. The preceding week, the *Banbury Guardian* was anticipating one of the largest and most fashionable gatherings which this town has witnessed for some years. The great aim of the Society was especially to create in the minds of the labouring population that spirit of rivalry, in the cultivation of their gardens, which is so conducive to their happiness, by drawing them insensibly from idle pursuits. When show day arrived the quiet town of Deddington presented a very cheerful and animated appearance. The 1858 show was the largest the Society had held, attracting nearly 1,000 visitors to Castle Grounds. Entertainment was provided by the Band of the Oxfordshire Militia. The archery competition was highly successful. *Nearly all the ladies were in appropriate uniform, consisting of*

a white muslin dress, green jacket, and white felt hat trimmed with green velvet and green feathers. This costume had a very graceful appearance, and when the fair competitors were in the attitude of shooting, it displayed their figures to great advantage, and as they proceeded to and from their targets, they looked quite bewitching, and formed a striking contrast to the gentlemen, not two of whom were dressed alike, and several sported the very extreme of undress. The Oxford Journal report continued, all the interest appeared to be concentrated in the ladies, who not only dressed much better, but shot much better. Miss Caparn, of this town, far out-shot her fair competitors, her arrows, at almost every flight, hitting not merely the target, but the bull's eye, with a precision worthy of Maid Marian. The Oxford Journal's correspondent concluded his report with the following gratuitous observation: It was a source of congratulation that the horticultural shows are no longer held in the Town Hall, which now has more the appearance of a cow shed, and looked extremely ugly, dilapidated, and insecure. It would indeed have been a matter of regret if so much loveliness in flowers, fruits, and last, though not least, the gentler sex, had been driven, as on many former occasions, to waste their sweetness in such an uncongenial shed.

The Oxford Journal correspondent clearly had a good sense of humour, although one wonders if the reference to the attractive figures of the lady archers was not, perhaps, a little risqué for the times.'

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Four Generations of Johnsons of Deddington

Our first advert appeared in the *Deddington News* in 1977. One of the pleasures of advertising in the magazine over many years is that people still come into the yard and say, 'I never knew you were here!' Considering Johnsons of Deddington has been trading since 1937, we still hear that remarkably often. Perhaps it is because our entrance is a little discreet. Perhaps it is because people assume we only sell timber and building materials or that we deal solely with the trade. Whatever the reason, we still enjoy meeting local residents who discover us for the first time, especially those who have lived in the village for years.

Johnsons began trading nearly ninety years ago and remains under the ownership and management of the same family, now into its fourth generation. In a world where businesses often come and go, we are proud to have remained independent, local, and family-run throughout changing times, changing fashions, changing governments and more than a few economic ups and downs. During that time the business has seen everything from a large fire in the yard during the Second World War to the disruption of Covid and, fortunately, Johnsons survived both.

Other than perhaps some of the farms, Johnsons may well now be one of the longest continually family-run businesses in the parish, although we suspect there may be one or two local families willing to challenge that claim.

Over the decades we have seen Deddington and the parish evolve enormously. New homes have appeared, old buildings restored, extensions added, gardens redesigned and countless DIY projects started with confidence and sometimes even completed on budget. Throughout all of that, we have tried to remain what we have always been: a dependable local merchant where people can buy anything from a few screws to the materials for an entire building project.

One customer may come in for a packet of batteries because the Co-op has sold out. Another might need drain unblocker, a paint brush or bag of sand. Meanwhile, someone else is planning a major renovation and orders enough timber and insulation to keep them busy for months. Then there is the last minute Friday afternoon rush when snow or heavy rain is forecast and suddenly residents urgently need rock salt or sandbags.

Many first time visitors are surprised by the size of the yard and the range of products we stock. From the road, we can appear deceptively modest. Once

through the entrance people often discover far more than they expected — timber, hardware, decorating materials, tools, fixings, household essentials and plenty besides.

We have always believed there is real value in having a local business where customers can walk in, explain what they are trying to achieve and speak to someone with practical knowledge and experience. Sometimes people know exactly what they need.

Sometimes they arrive with a vague description involving 'a thingy that goes behind another thingy'. We understand 'thingy'.

Being part of a village community also means that business is about far more than transactions. Over the years we have got to know generations of local families. Some customers first came to Johnsons with their parents and now visit with their own children. Others pop in regularly, not only for materials, but also for a quick chat and a catch-up on local gossip. That sense of continuity matters.

As Deddington continues to grow, with new housing and new residents arriving all the time, we remain grateful for the support the local community has shown us over many decades. Advertising in the parish magazine has always been part of maintaining that connection. People often assume advertising is simply about attracting new busi-

ness but for us it is equally about staying visible and reminding local residents that we are here when they need us. Villages change over time. New families move in, others move away and even long-standing residents can be surprised to discover what is tucked away behind our entrance.

The *Deddington News* reaches exactly the sort of audience we value most: local people. Some readers may only need us once a year for WD40, mousetraps or a replacement gate hinge. Others may be planning a major renovation or garden project or even needing plywood for their YouTube projects.

It is also our way of supporting a publication that helps keep local organisations, events and village life connected. Local businesses and community publications have always depended on one another to some extent and we are pleased to continue playing a small part in that tradition.

Of course, we still smile when someone walks in and says, 'I never knew you were here.' After nearly ninety years, we suspect we may still be hearing that for some time.

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READING THE RUNES

Will there be a *Deddington News* popping through village letter-boxes in September 2076? You could take a look into your crystal ball or you could ask Google AI. A 'Yes', though, is down to you, yes you, and to our advertisers — climate willing.

You, because we need an audience which touches on changing social mores where the instant gratification of scrolling and streaming are increasingly preferred to turning pages of books, magazines or newspapers. Will there still be a community-minded, literate audience for reading printed words in the future?

Much more crucial is where the volunteers will come from. This does not mean just those editing, dealing with advertisers and advertisements, handling administration and finance, and delivering the *Deddington News*. It also means contributors, those who take the time to sit down and write about what is of interest to readers and what is going on in our community. There are fewer willing to do that than even ten years ago. The search for people to give their time and talents freely is a growing problem, not just for us. The pages of the *Deddington News* regularly carry pleas for volunteers. The parish council, Cubs, Brownies, farmers' market, Deddington Town FC Youth, for example, are constantly asking for hands to fill gaps.

As new homes are added to the parish or people move to the area, the editors regularly receive encouraging and enthusiastic comments from newcomers about how they value the magazine. The pattern of messages suggests that people of 35 and over are those who really appreciate the community value of the *Deddington News*. But those kind words rarely convert into the volunteers we need to keep us going. If we can find them, then there could be a future for the magazine.

Which brings us back to the advertisers. During Covid, when *Deddington News* appeared online only, the message from advertisers was clear: we want the printed word, not an ephemeral appearance online on

Facebook, Instagram or even Deddington OnLine.

The *Deddington News* is not dependent on cover sales, unlike newspapers and magazines which have seen a drastic drop in sales. The *Oxford Mail*, for instance, sold 16,000-plus sales in 2013 but now sells fewer than 4,000. *The Daily Express*, selling more than four million at its peak, now sells just over a hundred thousand. *Reader's Digest* and *The Lady* magazines have vanished from British magazine racks. Instead the *Deddington News* is funded totally by advertising, allowing free delivery to Deddington, Hempton and Clifton. As long as those who advertise prefer the longer lasting impact of print to that found by fingers scrolling across a screen — and are willing to help pay for the increasing costs of ink and paper — then, as long as we can find the volunteers, there may be a future for those who appreciate the value of a community magazine and want more than a totally digital diet.

Costs are going up. Paper and ink are forecast to rise over the next year by anything between 4% and 12%, reflecting global uncertainties over energy, transport and other costs, thanks to an unpredictable United States.

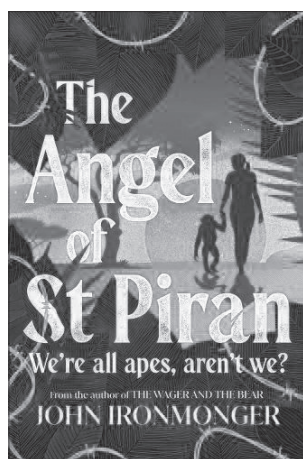
The *Deddington News*, as part of Deddington Media Community Interest Company, also funds Deddington OnLine and so faces increasing costs for web hosting and other internet services for this important and fascinating archive of material, historic and contemporary, photographic and written. Should the *Deddington News* die then it could only be a matter of time before Deddington OnLine degraded and disappeared.

The community that is Deddington, Hempton and Clifton would be the poorer without the *Deddington News* and Deddington OnLine, the sister service it supports financially. What is absolutely key to their survival is the human input. That is you, the reader, who could also be part of bringing the *Deddington News* to the community.

BOOK REVIEW

The Angel of St Piran by John Ironmonger



When does conservation mask animal exploitation? That question is at the heart of this thrilling novel, set in Tanzania. Young researcher, Angel, who lives among wild chimpanzees on a forested island, must fight for the animals' survival and her own against an organisation that provides wealthy hunters with opportunities to kill.

Many of us, revolted by images of hunters posing

proudly with their victims, are familiar with the argument that controlled trophy hunting can benefit wild animal populations and habitats. There's no doubting which side John Ironmonger is on; readers will be rooting for Angel and her chimpanzee companions against the pitiless invaders as the situation becomes ever more dangerous. Partly inspired by the work of the great Jane Goodall, the novel explores animal communication and how much we can learn from wild creatures when we're willing to listen. This was my introduction to an author with a thorough knowledge and passionate feeling for animal issues; I'm now eager to read his earlier novel, *The Wager and the Bear*.

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DRIVING UKRAINE

Since 2022, Driving Ukraine has provided hundreds of vehicles, dozens of unmanned ground vehicles (UGVs), many drone detectors and tonnes of aid: 61 convoys. More than 800 volunteers from over 30 countries have fundraised, driven and delivered vehicles to Ukraine, for frontline heroes to be there for that crucial moment to save lives. This support has changed the course of history. On several occasions our vehicles have helped hold sections of the frontline from being broken through, so that many Ukrainian defenders have been evacuated in our vehicles and survived, incoming drones have been brought down with our air defence vehicles, saving civilian lives. Thanks to our supporters, people came back to their families.

The war is still going on. To keep helping, we need to become systematic. So, we've created the Driving Ukraine Club. It's a monthly donation from £10 per month. You get access to the Club community chat where we share all our work and impact from across Ukraine, deeper and in real time and a monthly newsletter on everything we do. We can't end the war but we can help make sure Ukrainian defenders and civilians survive, whilst letting you know exactly the impact you are making. Your monthly support will go towards making every convoy possible, helping fund planning and coordination, logistics and operations and support the team behind every delivery, plus funding the vehicles, UGVs, and drone detectors. You won't just be funding one vehicle, you will make every vehicle delivery happen. See <https://drivingukraine.org/club/>.

To join a convoy, you don't need an HGV licence, a military background or a huge personal network. You just need five days, a sense of adventure, with age no barrier. Convoy 63 which left on 27 August included Mike O'Brien, John Parkinson and Pete Soddy. They call themselves Team 240 – their combined ages.

Convoy 58, our biggest ever – 26 vehicles, 70 volunteers, UGVs, drone detectors, seven countries, four days on the road and a classic Rolls Royce, took to the road on an unforgettable journey from Oxford to Lviv. Due to other world issues and in order to reignite interest and awareness of the war in Ukraine, YouTube motoring correspondent, Jay Emm of JayEmmOnCars, was asked to cover convoy 58. Jay drove the Rolls Royce to raise the profile of the event, spreading the word amongst his YouTube audience. Search YouTube 'We Just Drove a 1963 300,000 mile Rolls Royce Silver Cloud to Ukraine JayEmm on Cars'. An unexpected journey and a truly amazing and moving video.

A final word from Maksym Stodolia, Head of Ukrainian Operations, DrivingUkraine: 'Hey friends, I remember how the war started and how all of us Ukrainians had this feeling that we would be left alone with this problem, that the world would forget about us, that we would disappear and that we would lose our fight for our place in the sun. But from the very first days of the war, I saw dozens, then hundreds of people like you who gave their time to come to help us directly.

We started as a small organisation of people who simply cared. I can say with confidence that, for the Ukrainian military and for Ukrainians, Driving Ukraine has become an institution that individual units rely on. Thanks to you, hundreds of young Ukrainian men have made it back home alive. You, more than anyone, have proven that every single person can make a difference. Together, we continue to make a real difference in what is happening here. I want to thank you from the bottom of my heart for standing with us.'

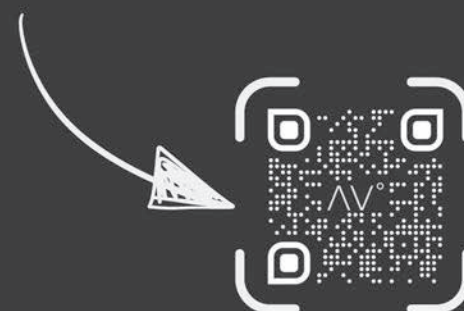

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SO WHOSE CHURCH IS IT?

Once upon a time long ago, the parish church of St Peter and St Paul in Deddington had a spire, like most of the surrounding village churches.

Until one day in 1634 it, together with part of the tower, crashed through the roof of the nave, leaving the villagers without the space in which they worshipped every Sunday, as people did in those days, and where they were baptised, married and buried. Deprived of their communal space what did they do? They cautiously decided not to risk another spire but, over the next 50 years, interrupted by the Civil War, they restored the sturdy tower, embellished it with its signature eight pinnacles and reroofed the nave.

I say 'they' restored it. Who were 'they'? 'They' were all the residents of Clifton, Deddington and Hempton who made up the parish of Deddington and whose forebears had built the original church for their use. The whole of England was, and continues to be, divided into parishes so every single person belonged to one parish or another and, therefore, bore part of the communal responsibility for the church, not only the building but also its operation, including hiring the vicar.

2026: the tower still stands and the roof is intact, thanks to Phillip Allan's fundraising drive of some 30 years ago. However, the 35-year-old heating system, a luxury undreamed of by the hardy villagers of the 17th century, but critical for less hardy 21st century residents, has reached the end of its life and can no longer be repaired. An unheated church would leave the community, as in 1634, without its lovely light and airy central village space, of recent years significantly updated with modern kitchen and loos. Not only will worshippers lose out but so will the audience for everything from the wide range of concerts, the variety of groups from the free Squiggles and Wiggles for pre-schoolers to the weekly Katharine House coffee mornings, the monthly craft market, music practice space – and so on.

So, who will solve the problem this time? 'They' will, of course. And who are 'they'? We have come to think of the church building as the responsibility of the active congregation and, by extension, of 'the Church', vaguely assumed to be some wealthy organisation, owning lots of lovely cathedrals etc. In reality the average regular congregation in Deddington is now fewer than 60 and the 'wealth' of the wider Church of England lies largely in its physical assets, ie its buildings – similar to farmers whose wealth lies in the value of their land and equipment, not in any liquid funds. While the Church has overhead costs, unlike a business it does not sell any revenue-making product to meet its ongoing obligations. Its heritage income, generated over time by the sale of ancient church lands and huge vicarages, can only meet approximately 20% of its annual running costs.*Included in these costs are specific grants for building repair but, for local churches, it is solely down to the parishioners to continue, as they have for centuries past, to pay for the regular



upkeep of the building and its running costs, as well as the stipend and the housing of the vicar, who is there to support all residents, regardless of any faith or none. The active congregation, who are a fraction of the population, valiantly soldiers on to meet its responsibilities.

Which brings us to the other 'parishioners': everyone else living in Clifton, Deddington and Hempton (and Barford?) who values the church building in ways other than as a place to worship: perhaps as the backdrop to our trip to the Co-op checking the clock or noting it striking the hour; attending the annual school leavers' service; picking up food from the porch on a Tuesday or Thursday to avoid it going to waste; attending one of the varied concerts, from jazz to chamber music; enjoying the parish show, the Photographic Society's annual exhibition, Nellie and Dove's charity fashion show; or even as a subliminal reminder of our forebears who built the communities in which we live. Unlike them, the majority of us do not use the church for worship but, in a secular age, nevertheless value the building for so many different communal purposes and need to share responsibility for it.

If we are to continue enjoying year-round use of this great space in the centre of the village, we urgently need to replace the unreliable 35-year-old heating system for which parts are no longer available. 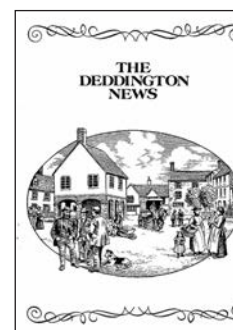
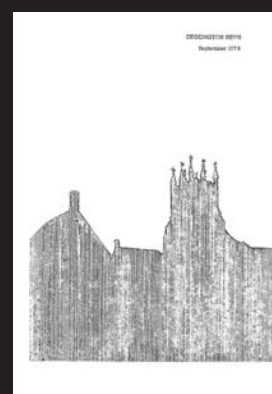
1986: Bellringers reported successfully raising £15,000 to restore the church bells, £1,500 provided by stall holders at Deddington's Grand Country Fair in July.

50 YEARS OF FRONT PAGES

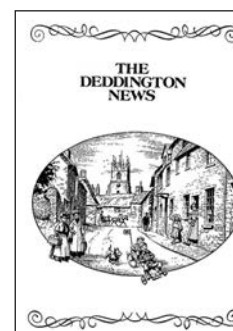
September 1976 and The Deddington News dropped through the letterboxes of homes in Deddington, Hempton and Clifton for the first time.

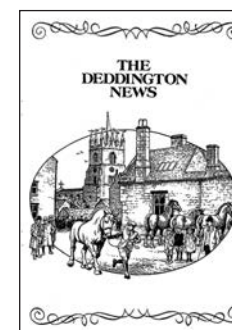

2012: Tennis club juniors proved victorious. The Neighbourhood Plan steering group questionnaire ready. A history of Hempton's Old School Room.



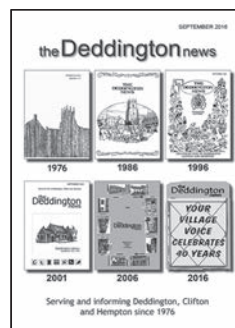

POSTCARD FROM AMERICA

Truth Social, Crypto, Election, World Cup, Fifty Years

Fifty years ago, as the *DN* team was launching the inaugural edition of this august publication, Hempton, in common with the rest of the UK, was sweltering in what was to be recognised as the warmest year so far with record temperatures, drought and water

shortages. Sitting roughly 490 feet above sea level along a high Jurassic marlstone ridge, Hempton felt the heatwave acutely. The exposed terrain made its surrounding agricultural fields highly vulnerable to drying out completely under the blazing sun. Such is the influence of the *DN*, a repeat, with interest, was ordered for the semi-centennial, Golden Jubilee celebration.

Hempton did not feature in the first edition in September 1976 but a worthy piece on the fate of the corner cottages at the crossroads appeared in the October edition. Having fallen into disrepair, there was talk of removing them before they succumbed to years of neglect, thus improving the appearance of the village. Partial collapse of the end cottage into the roadway left a bedroom open to view by passersby and some voyeuristic llamas grazing in the paddock opposite. In stepped the Campaign to Protect Rural England Oxfordshire Buildings Preservations Trust who bought the cottages for £12,000 and restored them for sale to the public.

The summer of '76 saw Hempton's sporting prowess exorcised with a Dwile Flunking match between the Hempton Harvesters and the Pheasant Pluckers at the Great Western Arms in Aynho. Despite their inexperience, the Harvesters held out against the Pluckers until the last throw which they sadly lost.

Meantime, Hempton residents' committee was striving to resolve the problem of the overflowing cess-pit servicing (or not) St John's Way, contemplating the enduring problem of the Gap, maintaining access to the playing field below St John's Way, repairing of the churchyard gate and fencing off the grassy mound at the crossroads, whilst organising wide-ranging social activities and events.

Further afield, Harold Wilson had resigned as UK Prime Minister in March 1976 and was succeeded by James Callaghan in April. Déjà vue!

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WHERE WERE YOU 25 YEARS AGO ON 9/11?

Most people of a certain age know exactly where they were 25 years ago on 11 September 2001. It was a sunny day in New York that Tuesday and all seemed well in the world save that economies and markets were still feeling the effects of the crash that was the bursting of the dot-com bubble.

It had started as a normal day and, like my American colleagues, I had arrived at my desk on the second floor of a 54-floor building in Lower Manhattan, 1 Liberty Plaza, at around 7.30am. I worked as a corporate banker for Royal Bank of Canada and our offices were immediately adjacent to the 110-floor South Tower of the World Trade Center.

Suddenly, at 8.46am, there was an enormous explosion outside and those of us near a window looked out. We could see people in the street looking up, but the Twin Towers were so tall we could see nothing. Pretty quickly an announcement told staff to move to the core of the building as bits of the tower were apparently raining down. We could see on an adjacent televi-

sion monitor that news reports were just coming in of an aircraft hitting the North Tower with initial images showing some flames. It was unbelievable. I called my wife, Sally, on a then rather basic cell phone (mobile). 'Turn on the TV. There are pictures of the North Tower at the World Trade Center. There's been an explosion and it's on fire.'

Seventeen minutes later at 9.03am, there was a second huge explosion. We had no idea what was happening although there were police, fire and ambulance sirens coming from all directions. Almost immediately, the Tannoy ordered the evacuation of our building. 'Do not return to your desks. Take nothing with you.' Could our building be next to be blown up?

Outside it was absolute chaos on the street, with onlookers, craning their heads to see what was happening, mixing with the emergency services. Someone said an aeroplane had hit the North Tower – no, that's not possible – maybe it was a light aircraft? It was so chaotic I decided to move on and get the subway

to midtown and the first train home. I attempted to call Sally again to give her an update on my whereabouts but the cell phone system had crashed.

Halfway home, at 9.59am, someone blurted out that one of the towers had collapsed. I had studied engineering at university and was pretty convinced this had to be wrong. Needless to say, when I walked in the door of our house, I found everyone in tears as they hadn't heard from me and wondered whether I'd been caught in the catastrophe of the collapsing buildings.

The Twin Towers had pancaked in place, with the steelwork encased in the surrounding plaza, although the dust clouds caused immense damage, blowing in windows and depositing a six-inch layer of sand and debris throughout lower floors of adjacent buildings.

It turns out that cleaning up the sand in these buildings was 'relatively' straightforward. The real problem was the asbestos distributed throughout the air-conditioning ducts and other less accessible areas: a nightmare to remove. It took six months for authorities to approve the return to our desks – six months of working from offices spread around Connecticut, New York, New Jersey and Toronto.

Personal belongings, including passports and wallets and, in my case, Buzz Lightyear were returned to us within a few weeks. Buzz had been a birthday present a few years previously and was sitting on my desk when the towers came down. He is a survivor and is on my desk today. 'To infinity and beyond!'

FARMERS' MARKET

This month is the 25th anniversary of Deddington Farmers' Market. The late Charles Newey, who lived in Clifton, felt that our local farmers needed support from their community during the foot and mouth outbreak and the idea of a market was born.

The current market wasn't the first market in Deddington. The first probably dates from the laying out of the borough in the 12th century. No royal charter creating a borough is known, but presumably one of Deddington's lords instituted burghage tenure and a market in order to profit from increased rents and tolls.

Burghage is a plot of land in a borough. When a lord wanted to make money, he would lay out a new street or market place – in Deddington, that's New Street and Philcote Street around the Market Place. He'd then carve it up into long, narrow plots with a short end facing the street. That frontage is where you put your shop or house. Then he'd rent it to a burgess, a townsman, for a fixed cash rent, usually 12d for a whole burghage, 6d for a half, as they recorded in Deddington in 1447. You can still spot these burghages on maps. Look at those long, thin garden plots running from the Market Place and New Street. Those are the fossilised burghage plots from the late 12th century.

Deddington started strong in the 12th century –

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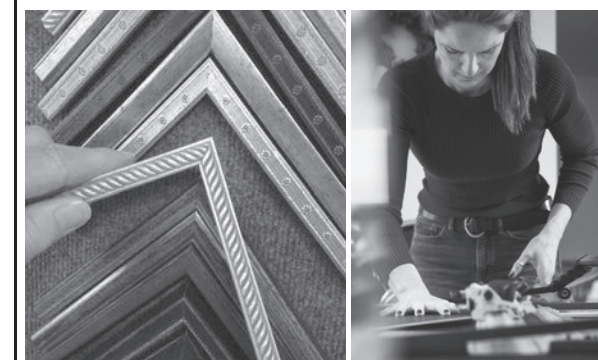
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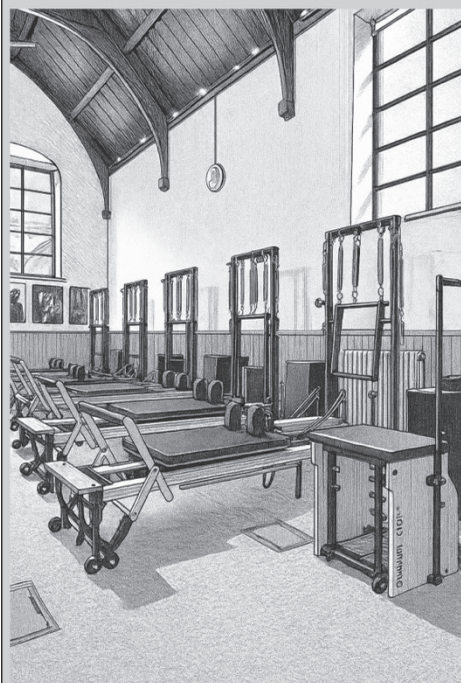
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CALLING ALL CLUBS
